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NOTEWORTHY ITEMS, UPDATES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- We welcomed Tamie Jacobs as our new Accounting Associate III.
- Dan attended several community meetings: 1.) met with project directors for the Candor (V) water line replacement discussing sample requirements for the next section of replacement; 2.) Waverly Village meeting to discuss an apartment complex with insect issues, where he covered basic expectations, best practices, and a time line to remedy; 3.) Met with DEC spill team, Suburban Propane, and insurance providers to explain water testing.
- Continued with Community Health Assessment (CHA) survey data collection until August 1st. Over 1000 responses collected on community survey. Health Educators analyzing data and summarizing for CHA. We hosted a CHA Steering Committee Meeting at Owego-Apalachin District Office. Data from our CHA Community Survey was reviewed and breakout groups began working on what interventions would go into the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).
- We nominated Town of Owego Chief Operator for a State Department of Health initiative seeking candidates of community systems with source water protection plan knowledge who are interested in proactively protecting drinking water source(s).
- Angel completed Child Passenger Safety Training Course, and Laura, Katie and Jordan attended the Child Passenger Safety Update Class
- Several members of our crew tabled at community events: Angel & Stephen tabled at the Catholic Charities Back to School Event providing outreach items; Jordan & Meagan tabled at the Tioga County Fair and provided outreach/education on children's program.
- Public Health Sanitarians have been busy: inspecting all temporary food sites at the Tioga County Fair, and all summer feeding sites (which had no violations).
- We were informed by New York State that the Owego Municipal Complex has been added as a Cooling Center in Tioga County; we had included the facility on Tioga County's 2022 Cooling Center list.
- Kylie trained Dental Van staff on Narcan administration and supplied the van with Narcan.
- Tioga County had its first Monkeypox case. We provided educational material throughout the County promoting awareness.
- Lisa M. completed New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control's training on Terrorism Indicators and Suspicious Activity Reporting for Fire/EMS.
- Ongoing recruitment for Public Health Nurse and Dentist.
- Ongoing support/partnership in: Team Tioga, Safe Harbor Committee, Allies in Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP), Tioga County Immunization Coalition, Anti-Hunger Task Force, Tioga County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Child Fatality Review Team, Care Compass Network PAC Executive Council, Tioga County Council of Governments, Board of Health, Rural Economic Partnership (REAP), and External Community Advisory Board MPH Program at Binghamton University, Immunization Action Plan Coalition, and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (LPPP) Coalition.



Legislature approves Veterans Service Assistant

At the August 9 regular meeting of the Tioga County Legislature; the legislature approved the hiring of a full time assistant to the Director of Veterans Services.

The Tioga County Veteran Services' Agency (TCVSA) has received new state aid for the Dwyer Program sand has a need to hire a full time assistant to both provide administrative assistance and act as back up to the agency's officers.

Legislative Chairman Martha Sauerbrey commented on the excellent work the TCVSA is doing in helping Tioga County's Veterans.

The legislature approved amending the 2022 budget and transferred funds and also approved a change order for the Park Settlement Bridge.

This bridge is in need of repair work according to the NYSDOT. Economy Paving Corp was awarded the construction contract in June; and now an order for additional work has been submitted.

Funding for \$90,000 was approved from the fund balance, moved into the Park Settlement Bridge account.

Legislator William Standinger noted, "I believe the Park Settlement Bridge is the longest wooden bridge in New York State; and appreciate it being kept open as the other bridge on that road is worse and this one is needed

Tiega Courty Courier 8/17/22 for emergency services to get to them are residents, if needed."

The Park Settlement Bridge is located in Standinger's district.

The Tioga County Public Health (TCPH) has been awarded funding from the NYS Department of Health.

The funding originated from the Centers for Disease Control, and that funding, in the amount of \$19,400, is designated for a "Priot budget. Program for Protecting Vulnerable Rrivate Wells and Smaller Water Systems."

The Department of Motor Vehicles has a need for a Customer Facing Device for the new workstation in the office; and NYS DMV requires that any computer hardware used in DMV transactions be purchased from

them and has a set price for the new equipment at \$4,094.

The legislature amended the DMV's budget and approved the purchase.

The Assigned Counsel Administrator's Office has been awarded an Indigent Legal Services Grant in the amount of \$61,902; and the legislature accepted and amended

A resolution was passed amending for an additional cost of \$133,020.84 for the additions to the computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) Project add Owego Police to CAD: Digital Evidence Module for Owego Pictometry for Mapping; Rapid Notification Module and Data Transfer Costs.

Swimming Safety

Swimming is an excellent way to be physically active during the hot summer months. However, it is important to take precautions while enjoying time in the water to prevent illness, injury, and even death. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, drowning is a leading cause of death among children ages 1-4 years. Furthermore, illnesses can be spread if people enter the water while sick with gastrointestinal symptoms, such as diarrhea. The good news is there are steps you can take before, during, and after swimming to protect yourself and your loved ones.

Before Swimming

- · Check for lifeguards. If no lifeguards are on duty, locate the safety equipment (ex. life preserver ring).
- Apply sunscreen with at least 15 SPF. Reapply every hour as sunscreen is not waterproof!
- · Ask a friend or family member to accompany you. Never swim alone.
- Make sure the water looks clean and is not cloudy or discolored.
- · Do not go in the water if you are sick with diarrhea.
- · Do not go in the water if you have an open wound or cut that is not completely covered with a waterproof bandage.
- To avoid slipping and falling, do not run around the pool deck. While Swimming
- · Keep an eye on children at all times. Avoid distractions while supervising.
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear lifejackets.
- · Do not dive or jump into shallow water.
- · Do not dive or jump if someone is in the area where you will land.
- · Do not swallow the water.
- Take kids on bathroom breaks and check diapers every hour.
- · Stay hydrated.
- · After Swimming Dry your ears to help prevent swimmer's ear.
- · Keep hydrating. Swimming can lead to dehydration as it is harder to recognize how much fluid you are losing. You can still sweat while in the water!


First Case of Monkeypox Identified in Tioga County

Tioga County Public Health has confirmed its first case of monkeypox in the county. The department confirms this is an isolated case and there are no associated close contacts. There is no health risk to the general public at this time. Tioga County Public Health is encouraging residents to be aware of the symptoms and take steps to reduce the risk of contracting the infection. Martha Sauerbrey, Legislative Chair says, "Residents do not need to feel alarmed, and she has complete confidence in Tioga County Public Health to manage the situation."

Monkeypox spreads through close physical contact between people.

This includes:

- Skin-to-skin contact with monkeypox sores, rashes, or lesions
- Skin contact with fabric or dressings that have contacted sores, rashes, or lesions
- Sexual activity with single and/ or multiple, partners that have monkeypox
- Prolonged, face-to-face contact where respiratory secretions are shared



Tioga County Public Health is encouraging residents to be aware of the symptoms of monkeypox and take steps to reduce the risk of contracting the infection.

Symptoms of monkeypox include:

- Rashes, bumps, or blisters on or around the genitals or in other areas like hands, feet, or face, which are not clearly due to something else
- Candor Chronicle 8/17/22

 Potential flu-like symptoms such as fever, aches and pains, fatigue, and chills

It's important to note an individual may experience all or only a few symptoms. The disease is contagious from the onset of symptoms or until the rash scabs have dried up and fallen off and the skin is healing well underneath.

Community members can reduce the risk of monkeypox by avoiding close face-to-face and skin-to-skin contact with someone who has a monkeypox-related rash or other symptoms, avoiding traveling to areas where monkeypox is present, and asking sexual partners if they have a rash or symptoms consistent with monkeypox.

If you are concerned about your risk to monkeypox or are experiencing symptoms, you should contact your primary care provider to assess your condition and help you take the appropriate next steps. A vaccine is available for those with high risk of infection, and antiviral medications are available to the infected. If you are uninsured or don't have a healthcare provider, you can call 211 or 1-800-901-2180.



Symptoms:





• Flu like symptoms: fever, headache, muscle aches, chills, and fatigue.

How Does Monkeypox Spread?

- Direct, physical contact with someone who has monkeypox sores.
- Respiratory droplets or oral fluids from someone with monkeypox.
- Contact with objects or fabrics (clothing, towels, bedding) that someone with monkeypox used.

How Can I Protect Myself?

- Ask sexual partners if they have a rash or other symptoms consistent with monkeypox.
- Avoid skin-to-skin contact with someone who has a rash or other monkeypox related symptoms.
- If you are exposed to monkeypox or are experiencing symptoms, reach out to your health care provider.

Discussing Threatening Situations








Are You Drinking Enough Water?







WHEREAS: The New York State Department of Health has instituted a mandatory New York State Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus (HWB) Program whereby it is the employers responsibility to submit its eligible workforce for the bonus; and

WHEREAS: A qualified employer who fails to identify, claim, and/or pay any bonus for more than 10 percent of bonus eligible workers may be subject to penalties of up to \$1,000.00 per violation of the HWB Program; and

WHEREAS: Tioga County Mental Hygiene (TCMH) and Tioga County Public Health (TCPH) have both identified eligible workforce employees; and

WHEREAS: Tioga County will incur no local share increase, as New York State will also reimburse "fringe benefit" costs associated with the HWB; and

WHEREAS: Budget Officer will need to modify "fringe benefit" budget lines as is appropriate; and

WHEREAS: Amending of Budget and Appropriation of Funds require Legislative approval; therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Budget Officer is authorized to make adjustments to "fringe benefit" budget lines as is appropriate; and be it further

RESOLVED: That available funds on 12/31/22 of this amendment and appropriation will be carried forward into the New Year.

Available services include congregate dining and home delivered meals, programs and activities for older adults, protective services, long term care services, and free home safety checks; therefore
